

## **Grand Pré - as found in the Nova Scotia Archives' *Community Card File***

The *Community Card File* of the Nova Scotia Archives is a resource that was created by Archives staff over decades from 1930 to 1980 as questions from the public were answered or items were seen in collections by Archives' staff. What was included in the *Community Card File* was based not on a comprehensive index of what may be found in newspapers, books and manuscripts from collections in the Archives but on what the public asked about over the years. It also generally includes entries based on the titles of books and archival collections added during the period from 1930 to 1980. The *Card File* is unlike a library index that was made with standards and rules. The *Card File* is eclectic in the way the information was added and the choice of what was included and the headings assigned. The cards may tell a story of an event or item or they could be a pointer to something else in the Archives collections.

It is also recognized that the 2022 Nova Scotia Heritage Day marks the Landscape of Grand Pré in contrast to the Community of Grand Pré and is reflective of the UNESCO designation of the landscape rather than any particular spot or event in the long history of the area. Grand Pré in the *Community Card File* draws attention to many elements some of which reflect the landscape but mostly to places, people and events in this area.

The cards have been grouped in three broad categories reflecting the Acadian, Planter and Tourism themes which were the focus of entries in the *Card File* and ordered by the headings in the file. In general *Acadians* reflects the early European settlement of the area and the lives of the Acadians. *Planters* reflects the impact of settlers who came in response to the invitation to New Englanders after 1758. *Tourism* reflects the National Historic Park of today, its predecessors and visitor attractions or travel accounts over the years. The entries are in the format: heading (in bold), followed by the text of the card, followed by the retrieval code or reference to the item in italics. (There may be multiple entries under a heading). Each of the entries in the *Card File* represents something which may be viewed at the Archives and requested using the retrieval code.

### **Acadian Bicentennial**

About 10,000 witnessed the Bicentennial Ceremonies for the Expulsion of the Acadians from Grand Pré. Priests from England, United States and Canada took part in the High Mass. There are some excellent pictures of the Stadium erected in the Park and one of the people present. Mr. Lesage, Minister of National Resources said that the Railway company was willing to transfer the park to the Crown, and if the National Assumption Society would also transfer the church, the Canadian Government would make the site a National Park.
